

Lesson Plan KS3



ART & DESIGN - Stained Glass Windows

Lesson Objective: To create a stained glass 'Organ' window celebrating music in the church.

Starter	Main Teaching	Resources
Look at the stained glass windows in SMSG Church and on the website www.parishstonystatfordcalverton.com Why does SMSG have some stained glass windows? (To let in light. To tell a story without words - like a picture book.) What do the stained glass windows tell us?	Activity 1 - Remember, Remember Using photographs from your visit to SMSG Church, show the students one at a time and ask them to name parts of the organ. (Pipes, keys, pedals, stops, pistons, console, casework) Activity 2 - Plan What parts would look most effective in a stained glass window? What signs or symbols could be used to add to the picture? (Musical notes, a treble clef, a bass clef, a bell...) Activity 3 - Design Let the students each draw a design for their stained glass window. A big and bold design with as little detail as possible. Use bright background colours to contrast with black and white keys and brown casework. Don't forget the gold pipes! Activity 4 - Create and Make Using tissue paper, cut out the items to be arranged on the window. Carefully arrange all the pieces inside the laminator pouch. Close it carefully! Teacher to seal the laminator pouches. The students can then stick them to the black 'window frame'. These can be displayed on a window as individual works or assembled to make one large window, or several larger windows.	www.parishstonystatfordcalverton.com - looking at St Mary & St Giles stained glass and gallery. A4 laminator pouches Tissue paper Black sugar paper for the 'window frames', possibly cut in advance.
